## Commencement

- Atlantic Cape celebrated its 57th Annual Commencement Ceremony on our Mays Landing Campus on May 16. Over 900 students were eligible to graduate this academic year, and 923 credentials were awarded. In attendance at the ceremony were 416 graduates and their families who celebrated their academic accomplishments.
- Dr. Brian Bridges, the Secretary of Higher Education from the Office of the Secretary of Higher Education (OSHE), delivered the Keynote Address, advising graduates to use their education as a tool to overcome the challenges they may face in order to create the change they would like to see for their lives and the world around them. The student speakers, SGA President Sultana Zakia and 4.0 High Honors student Abigail Tomasso, had inspiring remarks for their fellow graduates. Trustee Rev. Dr. Thomas Dawson delivered the Invocation and Benediction, and Registrar Robyn Berenato sang the National Anthem.

# **Community Outreach – Atlantic County**

- The College partnered with Stockton University at their 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Community *Clean Up and Party in the Park* in Atlantic City. Our Atlantic Cape students and staff were on hand to commemorate earth day through community service.
- Atlantic Cape was one of the sponsors of the Organizacion Azteca and El Pueblo Unido's *Dia del Niño Festival* at Pete Pallitto Field in Atlantic City on May 4 with over 1,000 children and their families in attendance to recognize the importance of children in our society and promote their well-being. This free event open to the public held a wide array of activities, such as door prizes, entertainment, refreshments, but most importantly vital resources and health screening for their families.

 The College also was a sponsor of the Hamilton Township Spring Carnival & Community Resource Fair on May 18. Our Community Outreach team was on hand to also share our education opportunities and resources with the community.

#### **Community Outreach – Cape May County**

- For the second year in a row on April 27, Atlantic Cape hosted the *Mexican Consulate of Philadelphia* on our Cape May County Campus. This event was able to service 200 local community members from Cape May County and assist them in obtaining vital documents, such as passports and birth certificates needed to be active members of our society in the U.S. Many attendees included Atlantic Cape's students and their families with dual citizenship.
- Throughout the month of May, Atlantic Cape's Cape May County Campus hosted Career Experience events for the Wildwood Middle School, where students from 6<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> grade got to explore Atlantic Cape and all the different career options available to them as they begin to think about their future. The event incorporated tables of regional industry leaders that allowed the students to talk with current professionals about different career fields.
- The Cape May County Campus also hosted a *Campus Experience* for Wildwood High School culinary students on May 8. **Chef Joe Sheridan, the Director of the Academy of Culinary Arts,** presented the students with the resources and information on the Culinary Certificate program offered in Cape May, as well as further opportunities in the culinary field Atlantic Cape has to offer. The experience included a campus tour, highlighting our culinary kitchens in Cape May.

## **High School Partners**

 Atlantic Cape and the American Association of University Women (AAUW) of Atlantic and Cape County branches hosted *TeenTech* on May 10, an event for high school teenage girls to explore career fields in STEM.
